Next Steps After Receiving Offers

Questions to Ask

- In-Person Requirements Can you work remote? Is this flexible?
- Clarify institutional access to observatories and computing clusters.
- Ask about opportunities and funding for student mentorship.
- Confirm visa requirements (e.g., whether the institution sponsors H1-B visas).
- For General Postdocs:
 - Contact previous or current group members to learn about their experiences in the research group.
 - Inquire about the specifics of the project, including expectations, timelines, and potential collaborators.

Negotiation Points

General Considerations

- **Travel Funds:** Ensure there is adequate funding for conferences and research-related travel.
- Relocation Support: Ask about relocation assistance, including temporary
 accommodations until you find a permanent place, and whether they provide a
 house-hunting trip in advance.
- Start Date: Negotiate a start date that works for both you and the institution.
- Office Space: Discuss preferences for your office setup, such as having windows or specific furniture arrangements.
- **Decision Timeline:** Request sufficient time to accept the offer if you are waiting on responses from other opportunities.
- Hardware: Confirm what equipment (e.g., laptops, monitors) will be provided.
- Office Setup: Ensure that basic office needs, such as monitors or other peripherals, are covered.
- **Salary:** Some positions may allow for salary negotiations; this depends on the specific institution and funding source.

Private Funding (e.g., Heising-Simons Funding)

Private, non-government-based grants may offer more flexibility in negotiations. For example, it may be reasonable to ask for:

- Higher relocation fees.
- Early provision of a laptop or other research tools.

- A salary match with other job offers you've received.
- Expanded travel or research funds if relevant.
- Guaranteed access to computing resources.

Tip: If you have competing offers, you can leverage the benefits offered by other institutions to negotiate with the organization offering private funding.

Fellowship vs. General Postdoc

Personal Research vs. Specific Topics:

 Fellowships often allow for more focus on personal research, while general postdocs might be tied to specific projects.

• Time Allocation:

 Fellowships may provide more freedom to dedicate time to your own projects compared to general postdocs that may have functional or collaborative work requirements.

Level of Guidance:

 Consider whether you prefer more guidance and structure or greater independence as a postdoc.

Combining Fellowships:

 If you have two fellowship offers, inquire if a joint position can be arranged between the two fellowships and institutions.

Preparations Before Arrival

• Email Ahead of Time:

- A few months before arriving, contact your new institution to:
 - Set up email accounts and computer access in advance.
 - Ask about relocation resources and possible accommodations.

Connect with Other Postdocs:

 Request to be introduced to other postdocs at your new institution to build your professional network and get familiar with the environment.
